## 1. **Message from key school bodies**

### **School Board**

We recognise that parents are the primary educators of their children, with a right to choose schools for their children.

Saint Mary MacKillop College Albury aims to provide a choice of schooling to all those seeking an independent school providing instruction in the Catholic faith. We aim to prepare students both academically and spiritually to become people of virtue and strong character.

This is an exciting time for the school as we prepare to celebrate the fifteenth year of the school. It is pleasing to see excellent academic results across all year levels due to the dedication and hard work of the staff and students. The school has come a long way since those first days and we look forward to its continued growth, with the plans for our new buildings firmly underway

### **Principal**

Is it sensible, that is, wise or prudent, to pack everything one possesses, sell the house and move to Albury in order to enrol one's children in a tiny, relatively untested school, certainly in terms of years of operation, purporting to be Catholic, but not really, but actually really, not quite in the middle of nowhere, but in close proximity to it? Many, I fear, would doubt the wisdom and prudence of it.

Raising further doubts, families that move here, even for the noblest of purposes, typically, do not have an easy time of it. On the contrary, work is hard to find and settle into, accommodation has become scarce and elusive, both children and parents feel the dislocation, the loss of familiar faces, routines and support structures that hitherto have been largely taken for granted. It all has to be rebuilt. It all takes time, effort, resources and not a little grace.

Why would that be sensible? Because putting your faith in Jesus is the most sensible thing you can do and transmitting our Catholic faith to our children is the most important task we have been given.

I want to thank those who have built this community. Among the many who have contributed, especially in the early days, two families for whom 2022 marks their final year with children enrolled in the school stand out: the Perrys and the Horsfalls.

Con and Jennette moved from Alice Springs to Wagga Wagga to Jindera and finally to Lavington, raising 9 children and enrolling several of them in the first year of SMMC's operation some 14 years ago.

Notably, their daughter Isabel was the first student to graduate after spending all 13 years of her schooling at SMMC, and Isabel's older brother Michael, who also attended Saint Mary MacKillop, was ordained to the diaconate earlier this year and, God willing, will be made a priest of Jesus Christ in 2023.

Michael's older brother Connell was ordained a priest last year, making that two priests in the family. With Sam graduating, there won't be a Perry at the school next year, but the Infants classes will continue to delight in the playground they were instrumental in building so many years ago and you will long be - not just remembered - but revered for their devotion to prayer and the sacraments.

Simon and Kathleen famously founded the school 15 years ago and put their 9 children through, with their youngest, Clare, graduating this year as college captain. As with Con and Jennette, the fruit of Simon and Kathleen's labours can best be seen in their children who excel in faith and virtue.

Good things happen when good people make them happen. Some might lament that schools are very often places of ideological propaganda and poor example, even Catholic schools. But who among us has the drive to actually do something about it, rather than just complain and wish that it were different? Simon and Kathleen had that drive and did it; in the style of St Mary MacKillop's, "never see a need without doing something about it." We are here because Simon and Kathleen saw the need and did something truly monumental about it.

## 2. **Contextual Information about the school**

Saint Mary MacKillop College Albury is a small, caring school in a rural setting. It is an independent school providing instruction in the Catholic faith for students from Kinder to Year 12, with a strong emphasis on character formation through the virtues. The lives of the saints feature in the day-to-day life of the school, as does the celebration of special feast days from the Catholic calendar.

The educational aim of the school is the critical communication of Catholic culture and the total development of the individual. The School motto is Verum, Pulchrum et Bonum (Truth, Beauty and Goodness). As Catholics we believe that we live in a universe created by a loving God. Everything in the cosmos bears the stamp of the Creator – it is true, beautiful and good. Education is about encouraging our students to develop by seeking out truth, beauty and goodness in all that they do.

Saint Mary MacKillop College was founded in the small rural community of Jindera in 2009 and year levels were gradually added until the first Year 12 Class graduated in 2014. Saint Mary MacKillop College currently has students in all year levels from Kinder to Year 12.

The school recognises parents as the first educators of their children and works to support them in their vital role. Each term the school runs a parent evening which often includes a guest speaker to speak on topics such as parenting or an aspect of the Catholic faith. Saint Mary MacKillop College also takes an active part in ANZAC Day, Australia Day and Christmas events in the local community.

With the help of parents, we run two major fundraisers each year, namely the Saint Mary MacKillop Gala Dinner and our annual school Country Fete.

### **Monitoring daily attendance**

The College has implemented the following systems and procedures in order to monitor the daily attendance of students and to identify absences from the College:

School attendance is recorded by electronic roll marking using the Compass online school management program. This is done each morning by the class teacher or home room teacher in the high school. This is followed up by a second roll marking after lunch in the primary classes and for each subsequent subject lesson in the high school classes.

The Compass online administration system is also used to record late arrivals and early departures of students.

Staff members will use the appropriate codes when roll marking. These attendance codes are listed on the AIS website. The common code approved by the Minister must be used.

### **Analysing student attendance data**

Saint Mary Mackillop College Albury has processes in place for monitoring student attendance data.

### **Following up unexplained student absences**

The College has implemented the following systems and procedures to follow up on unexplained absences from College:

Attendance at school is compulsory, if a student is absent their parent or guardian must notify the school as to the reason for the absence. Parents must notify the school of a student absence via the Compass school management system, by a hand-written or emailed note, or phone call.

### **Unsatisfactory attendance intervention strategies**

The College has implemented the following strategies to improve unsatisfactory attendance and student engagement in school and learning:

Unexplained absences need to be acted upon promptly. Automatic messaging is sent via Compass to the parent/guardian of any student who is absent with no explanation to request a reason for their absence. This is then followed up by Administration staff by email and/or telephone if a reason is still not provided.

Patterns of continued or frequent absence of a student need to be brought to the attention of the Principal by the administration staff and class/homeroom teachers. Intervention strategies need to be implemented in the case of poor attendance to improve learning and student engagement in the school.

Where the destination of a student below seventeen (17) years of age is unknown, the school has a duty of care to notify the Department of Education ([attendance@det.nsw.edu.au](mailto:attendance@det.nsw.edu.au)) with the student's full name, date of birth, last known address, last date of attendance, parents' names and contact details, an indication of possible destination and other relevant information that may assist officers to locate the student, including any work health and safety risks associated with contacting the parents or students.

### **Student welfare**

In accord with the principles of the Gospel and of the teachings of the Catholic Church, our school regards the safety of its students – not just physically and emotionally, but spiritually and morally – as integral to their full development as children of God and members of Christ’s body.

### **Student discipline**

The College does not sanction the administering of corporal punishment by non-school persons, including parents, to enforce discipline at the school.

Saint Mary MacKillop College recognises that self-discipline is intrinsic to the Christian life, and that the true order willed for us by God can only be achieved when our lives are ruled by reason and enlightened by Faith. To this end, we guide and assist our students to understand the meaning of true freedom and goodness and to strive for it individually and collectively.

### **Anti bullying policy**

The College seeks to raise awareness among students of the bullying issue, to challenge the view that victimisation and bullying are a natural part of life, but rather to develop an ethos which refuses to condone or omit to deal with the issue. It is the right of all individuals in the school community to be free of bullying and, if bullied, to be provided with help and support.

- To avoid the bullying or victimisation of others
- To try to help students who are being victimised
- To attempt to include students who become easily left out.

Staff work closely with parents and teachers so that opportunities to build character in students is maximised. The aim is the character education of all students, including those who have behaved inappropriately.

### **Complaints and grievances**

The School aims to provide an environment for students and parents conducive to open and honest communication. It is our desire to facilitate an atmosphere of trust and cooperation.

There is a formal process for handling complaints and grievances. The school policy for handling complaints and grievances is on our website.

A person is not to be disadvantaged or discriminated against in any way for filing a complaint. As a matter of principle, anonymously filed complaints will not be processed.

13. **School determined improvement targets**

**2021 Targets**

- K-2 teachers accessed professional learning and began the process of reviewing resources. A new Maths resource was implemented throughout the primary school.
- The new position of Primary Coordinator was created to assist students with additional learning needs to ensure they get the necessary support.
- There was a particular focus on the improvement of teaching expertise through collaborative professional learning, making the assumption that most of our professional learning resources are to be found in the expertise of staff members themselves and through conversations that centre on teaching practice.

**2022 targets**

- Improved delivery of the school instructional model through an understanding of cognitive load.
- Preparing for the implementation of K-2 new English and Maths syllabuses for the NSW Curriculum.
- Setting professional learning goals for teachers on three areas identified and developed by staff: improving participation and engagement, which was identified after reviewing attendance data in the first half of 2022, improving approaches to prayer, which was identified by the Wellbeing Team, and refining an element of the instructional model. Lesson observations and feedback will be held in 2023.

14. **Initiatives promoting respect and responsibility**

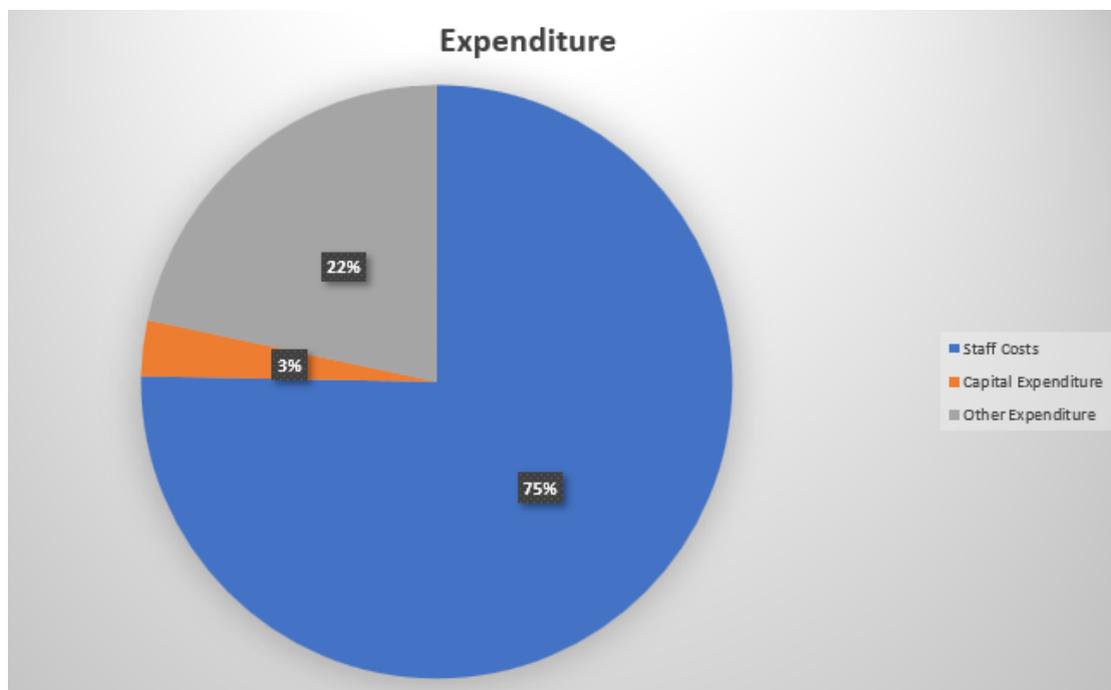
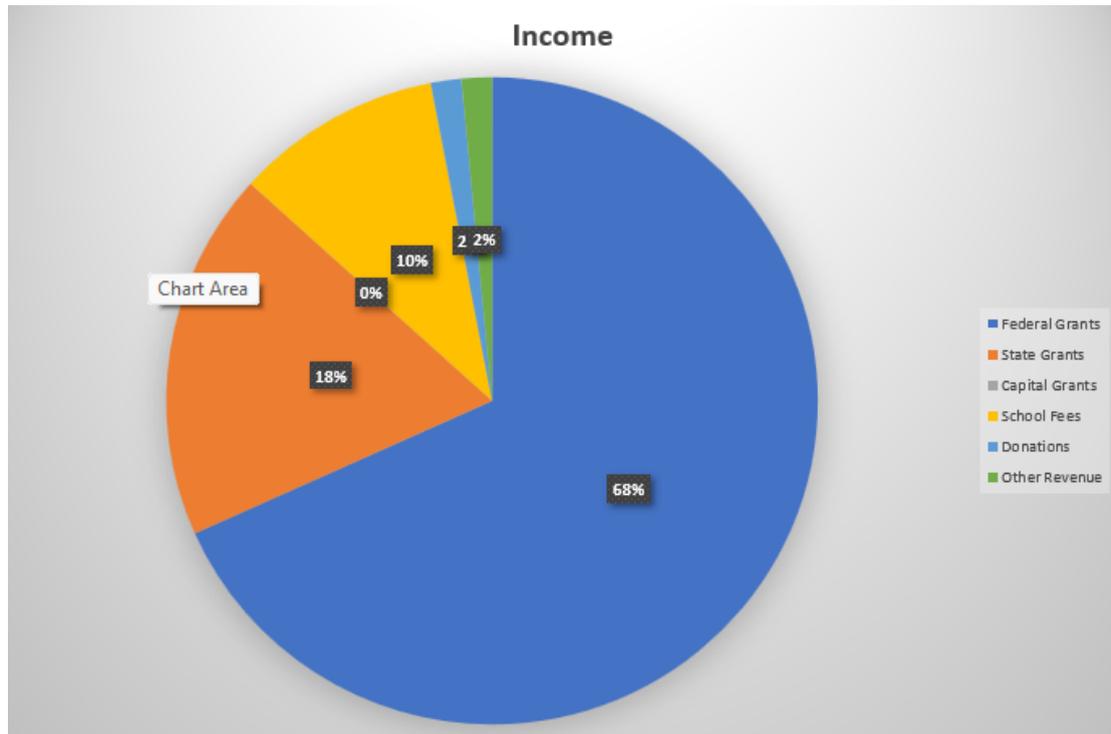
- A staff Wellbeing Team was established
- Specific assigned responsibilities such as gardening, flying flags, bin duty, library monitoring, prefect duties and working bees
- Student presentations at school assemblies
- Monthly rotation of virtues and character education program

15. **Parent, student and teacher satisfaction**

As at the 2022 Census date, Saint Mary MacKillop College Albury had 174 full time students enrolled, a net loss of 21 students compared to the previous year. The loss is mainly attributable to the impact of the Covid-19 vaccine mandates. Nonetheless, 9 new families commenced in 2022. There is a strong community culture that is supported by close ties to the parish, broader community and extended family groups. Small class sizes, staff dedicated to the school ethos and engaged parents work in concert to lift the quality of education and reinforce the fundamental values of truth, beauty and goodness that define the character of the school.

With the re-emergence after the pandemic, parents demonstrated their satisfaction by attendance at specially catered-for Parent Nights, class representatives on the School Advisory Council, Mass and assemblies, parent teacher interviews and the Annual Gala Dinner. For the first time, the College Presentation night was held at St John's Hall, rather than on the school basketball court, thus catering for large numbers in relative comfort.
